EDUCATION

WAC Winter Classes

The Washington Alpine Club offers a superb series of classes to our members. Instructors are club members who gladly volunteer their time, enthusiasm and experience. The WAC partners with other organizations from time to time to offer other relevant classes.

Telemark & Randonee

We offer the NW's largest and best known telemark ski program, and have added a randonee program. From beginner all the way to advanced there is a section for you to improve and refine your skills! Our Wednesday evening series starts in January and continues for six weeks! Registration begins in October each year.

Nordic Ski Clinics

We offer Nordic skiing workshops for all levels, taught by PSIA level III instructors karel and Eli. A combination of classic and skate styles. We might do a workshop in Jan. Feb. and March.

Kids Nordic Ski Classes

The Junior Nordic Program is a progressive program to teach children all-round skills for Nordic skiing. For ages 4 to 8, we focus on striding (classic) and downhill skills. Starting around age 8 or 9, kids learn to skate. Kids age 9 and older split their season between classic and skating styles. For kids under the age of 10, learning through games and adventure is very important. Kids in Treasure Trails, Little Nordis, and Freeheelers will play a variety of games like treasure hunts, skiing off trail through the woods, playing soccer on skis, and having snowball fights all in the process of learning to ski well. When kids enter High Pros and are ready to for directed technique coaching, they'll be solid striders and skaters. January to March.

Telemark & Randonee Ski Class - Wednesday Nights!

Come join the oldest and largest telemark/randonee ski instruction program in the entire US. Whether you a novice or you have years of experience there is a class for you. Develop your skills so you can enjoy the backcountry even more.

The WAC Wednesday night Telemark / Randonee program has classes for skiers of all abilities -- So if you've never skied before or if you've skied for years, this program will help you have more fun on the snow.

There are six sessions: Wednesdays in January and February 2010. Classes start at 7:30PM and end at 9:30PM. Classes are being held at Snoqualmie Pass Central. Instruction is provided by professional ski instructors.

Don't delay -- sign up today -- registration closes on December 26th and no last minute on the hill sign ups this year.

Junior Nordic Program

The Junior Nordic Program is a progressive program to teach children all-round skills for Nordic skiing. For ages 4 to 8, we focus on striding (classic) and downhill skills. Starting around age 8 or 9, kids learn to skate. Kids age 9 and older split their season between classic and skating styles. For kids under the age of 10, learning through games and adventure is very important. Kids in Treasure Trails, Little Nords, and Freeheelers will play a variety of games like treasure hunts, skiing off trail through the woods, playing soccer on skis, and having snowball fights all in the process of learning to ski. When kids enter High Pros and are ready for directed technique coaching, they'll be solid striders and skaters.

Treasure Trails (TT)


Teaches our youngest skiers (age 4-6) basic ski skills: skiing in a directed manner in a track, straight run in the tracks, getting up, snowplow and turning with a snowplow. The kids play lots of games and search for treasure each week.

Little Nords (LN)

Focuses on children age 6-9. Little Nords is broken into 3 groups. Group 1 is for 6-9 year olds who have not gone through Treasure Trails. They will learn Treasure Trails skills with an older group of kids. Group 2 are Little Nords who have moved up from TT or who already have TT skills. Group 2 works on better striding skills and strong downhill skills. Group 2 will begin skiing in the upper area towards the end of the season. Group 3 have completed a year of LN or come in with Group 2 skills. Group 3 will begin learning to skate and work on advanced downhill skills (stem-christies, parallel, and tele turns). Group 3 will often ski the upper area.

Freeheelers (FH)

Focuses on kids age 9-13. Freeheelers are broken into 3 groups. Group 1 is for kids, age 9-12, who are new to Nordic skiing. They will work on LN Group 2-3 skills. FH Group 2 is for kids who have moved up from LN Group



3 or already have strong downhill skills and can skate. Group 2 works on perfecting their striding and skating form. FH Group 3 is for the older Freeheelers and they work on perfecting their classic and skate skiing and will ski for longer distances. Group 3 begins to work on skiing at higher speed. Some kids in Group 3 may begin racing.

High Pros (HP)

High Pros are our 14 and old kids who are working on race level skiing. Kids in High Pros are not required to race, but many kids in High Pros do and sessions will focus on training for skiing fast and efficiently.

Wolf Haven International

Wolves have been confirmed in the Pasayten/Winthrop area, and even in Oregon. Word on the Pacific Crest Trail is that it won't be long until they are seen in the Central and South Cascades.

In Olympia's backyard is a nationally known and respected animal sanctuary – Wolf Haven International. Located just 16 miles south of downtown Olympia, Wolf Haven has rescued over 100 wolves during its 27 years in operation. Our sanctuary is home to many captive wolves who had no other place to go. The wolves are treated with great respect and are housed in the most natural environment possible. Over 20,000 people visit our wolf sanctuary each year.

There are various volunteer opportunities at Wolf Haven:

Tour Guides get an insider's view of the wolves and meet visitors from around the world. By giving tours, you help to dispel the myths and misunderstandings that many people still have about wolves. Training and materials are provided.

Grounds and gardening volunteers help beautify the 80 acres of the property. Get exercise, enjoy the fresh air, and work for a great cause all at the same time!



Special Events volunteers help with both fundraising and “friend raising” gatherings at the beautiful Wolf Haven grounds. Special events occur during summer and early fall, and volunteers help with art and crafts, education, organization, registration, food, and other areas.

Other volunteer jobs include short term office and community outreach projects.

We provide opportunities for learning about wolves and other animals in the Northwest, through exclusive volunteer classes and field trips.

Hear what one of our volunteers says about her experiences at Wolf Haven:


