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Snoqualmie Mountain and a little history



A miners trail to Cave Ridge ended at the junction between the two peaks. Hikers today will come to a signed junction at about 4,000 feet, near Cave Ridge where they can decide which peak to climb, Snoqualmie Mountain or Guye Peak.

The unofficial trail begins from Alpentel about 50 feet east (right) from the Snow Lake trailhead. Hike a few paces (east) from the Snow Lake trailhead and look for the trail near a stream -- in summer the start of the trail is partially obscured by brush and lined with alders.

Snoqualmie Mountain is situated at the edge of the Alpine Lakes Wilderness, 2 1/2 miles north of Snoqualmie Pass. It is one of the Ten Lodge Peaks named by the Mountaineers in 1923. Nearby Guye Peak is another Ten Lodge Peak and also can be accessed from this trail. The other peaks are Denny Mountain, Kaleetan Peak, Kendall Peak, Red Mountain, Chair, Thomson, the Tooth and Silver Peak.

Snoqualmie Lodge was a frequent base camp for mountaineers because there are more than 30 peaks in the region that can be climbed. A second set of Ten Lodge Peaks were named by 1930 and some of these were considered more challenging than the first 10. Guye Peak is a thimble-shaped peak that stands out near Snoqualmie Pass. Forbidding as it may appear from Interstate 90, it is a non-technical summit reached by a way trail.

The region near Snoqualmie Pass is rich in history and riddled with old trails. By the 1880s there were several mining claims on the mountain. Guye Peak was named for F.M. Guye, who staked several claims in the 1880s. Guye constructed a cabin that could still be seen from the Snow Lake Trail in the 1920s, but no trace remains today.

Shortly beyond the brushy start the trail grows steep and stays steep most of the way, climbing in about 1,000 feet through forest to a large boulder field where an unofficial trail sign is bolted to a tree. Guye Peak (5,168 feet) is to the right -- if Snoqualmie is your goal, stay left.

The trail to Snoqualmie Mountain makes a short descent to cross a stream between two waterfalls; this stream is usually dry in late summer (carry water). This is a scenic spot and provides respite from the steep grade. Beyond the waterfall, the trail continues its unrelenting climb, but the views are spectacular once you break out of the trees, and soon you will be looking down on the distinct summit of Guye Peak.

The trail continues to the summit of Snoqualmie at 6,278 feet. Although the route is steep, the trail's grade improves once you leave the trees for the final ascent, and you get the feeling there may have been a "real" trail here long ago. Views of the other Lodge Peaks grow every step of the way.

WAC Nostalgia from Ira Rushwald



Seattle Mountain Rescue ("SMR") was officially organized in the spring of 1948 under sponsorship of the Washington Alpine Club, the Mountaineers, and the Northwest Region of the National Ski Patrol. An extensive training program was immediately begun.

The first full-scale mission for the new organization came in September, when Robert Thorson, a Bremerton Eagle Scout, the student body president at Bremerton High School, and the son of a prominent physician, was reported injured on the Brothers. SMR reached the accident site below the summit shortly after sunrise to find that Bob had died as a result of the fall. He is commemorated today by "Thorson Peak" located in the Pershing Massif across the valley from the Brothers.
